

#### Jesus loves the little children

A few weeks ago, I was talking with one of our parishioners in the Fellowship Center at coffee and donuts on Sunday after Mass. He and his wife were getting their young children, including their three month old daughter, bundled up and ready to head home. As I commented on the new newest member of the family and her joyful smile, he simply responded that Jesus loves the little children.

Actually he said, "Jesus loves, loves, loves the little children. They are so free; they don't sin. We are supposed to be like them. Jesus loves, loves, loves the little children."

One of the great blessings of our parish is having so many little children. We have so many young couples and young families, which means we have so many little children at Mass. It is one of the first comments I often get from visitors to our parish. Many parishes do not have this. At St. Mary on Sunday, you have heard many little voices at Mass. It is so good.

From time to time, someone asks why don't we have something for children at Mass – a place to go, something that would allow them to hear the Gospel at their level. Many parishes do this and it is often called Children's Liturgy of the Word. These requests come from parishioners sometimes, and sometimes parents of young children themselves. I know it might be easier for some to concentrate on the Gospel or the homily if we did this. I do think that age appropriate teaching is important. I know Mass can seem very difficult when children get the wiggles, or are having a hard day, or are tired or frustrated. I know these times can make it difficult to pray at Mass. Maybe you sometimes even think that it would have been better to stay at home. I have a conviction, however, that the benefits of us all being at the whole Mass together as a family, and as a big parish family, far outweigh the benefits we could receive from inviting our children out of Mass for the readings and homily. I believe that it is important to pray together and stay together.

I want parents to know that I support you. I support you when worshipping at Mass is a challenge. Before I was a priest, one of my favorite ways to pray at Mass was in my pew, eyes closed, shutting everything else out. Since I was ordained a priest, I have traded this way for something better – being able to offer the Sacrifice of the Mass to God, for you all. But with that "better" I never get to close my eyes and pray from a pew, I very rarely get to hear a homily, and if something doesn't go as planned at the parish on Sunday, I am responsible for the solution. I am not complaining, this is simply just the reality. I share this because in your beautiful vocation to marriage and family, you may not often get to pray as you wish. Maybe you wish you could just kneel in your pew shutting out the world too. But your vocation as a parent doesn't allow that. Your "better" might sometimes mean you are holding, helping, or consoling a little one. I believe there is profound grace in that, and not just for you, but for all of us.

That doesn't mean that we as a parish family aren't open to ways we can help. The readings are in the bulletin to help parents follow along. We have Mass bags in the vestibule of the church that contain some age appropriate books and religious items to help them at Mass. Children can feel free to pick out their Mass bag when they arrive to church and return it at the end of Mass. There is a nursery through the glass door to the left of the altar for times when a parent and child might need a few minutes alone together. Our "Children's Gospel Corner" is returning to the Fellowship Center. This is similar to Children's Liturgy of the Word, but immediately after

Sunday Mass. It is the Gospel and an activity or craft to explain it in an age appropriate way. It is our hope as well that it might allow parents a few minutes to socialize during coffee and donuts. Right now, we will begin offering it once a month, but if we can have enough volunteers we can bring it back more often. Please feel free to email me or Mary Jiovani at the parish (mjiovani@st-mary.org) if you would like to volunteer or find out more info. If you have other ideas, please feel free to let us know what you think might be helpful.

I love that our church is filled with families at Mass. I also appreciate that we all stay at Mass together. We are a parish that loves life!

This past Sunday, as I celebrated the baptisms of six of our newest parishioners and saw so many little ones at Mass with their amazing parents, I thought of our parishioner's words, "Jesus loves, loves, loves the little children." As we journey through Lent, let us pray for one another.




Be advised, this movie is <u>Rated R</u> for sequences of graphic violence. Children will not be admitted.



So he went and washed, and came back able to see.

His neighbors and those who had seen him earlier as a beggar said,

"Isn't this the one who used to sit and beg?"
Some said, "It is, " but others said, "No, he just looks like him."
He said, "I am." So they said to him, "How were your eyes opened?"

He replied, "The man called Jesus made clay and anointed my eyes and told me, 'Go to Siloam and wash.' So I went there and washed and was able to

see." And they said to him, "Where is he?" He said, "I don't know."

They brought the one who was once blind to the Pharisees. Now Jesus had made clay and opened his eyes on a Sabbath. So then the Pharisees

also asked him how he was able to see.

He said to them,

"He put clay on my eyes, and I washed, and now I can see."

So some of the Pharisees said,

"This man is not from God, because he does not keep the Sabbath." But others said.

"How can a sinful man do such signs?" And there was a division among them. So they said to the blind man again,

"What do you have to say about him, since he opened your eyes?" He said, "He is a prophet."

Now the Jews did not believe that he had been blind and gained his sight until they summoned the parents of the one who had gained his sight. They asked them,

"Is this your son, who you say was born blind? How does he now see?" His parents answered and said,

"We know that this is our son and that he was born blind. We do not know how he sees now, nor do we know who opened his eyes. Ask him, he is of age; he can speak for himself."

His parents said this because they were afraid of the Jews, for the Jews had already agreed that if anyone acknowledged him as the Christ, he would be expelled from the synagogue.

For this reason his parents said,

"He is of age; question him."

So a second time they called the man who had been blind and said to him, "Give God the praise! We know that this man is a sinner."

"If he is a sinner, I do not know.

One thing I do know is that I was blind and now I see."

So they said to him,

"What did he do to you? How did he open your eyes?"

He answered them,

"I told you already and you did not listen.

Why do you want to hear it again? Do you want to become his disciples, too?" They ridiculed him and said,

"You are that man's disciple; we are disciples of Moses! We know that God spoke to Moses, but we do not know where this one is from." The man answered and said to them,

"This is what is so amazing, that you do not know where he is from, yet he opened my eyes. We know that God does not listen to sinners,

but if one is devout and does his will, he listens to him. It is unheard of that anyone ever opened the eyes of a person born blind. If this man were not from God, he would not be able to do anything." They answered and said to him,

"You were born totally in sin, and are you trying to teach us?" Then they threw him out.

When Jesus heard that they had thrown him out, he found him and said, "Do you believe in the Son of Man?"

He answered and said, "Who is he, sir, that I may believe in him?"

Jesus said to him,

"You have seen him, the one speaking with you is he."

He said, "I do believe, Lord," and he worshiped him.

Then Jesus said,

"I came into this world for judgment, so that those who do not see might see, and those who do see might become blind."

Some of the Pharisees who were with him heard this and said to him, "Surely we are not also blind, are we?" Jesus said to them,

"If you were blind, you would have no sin;


but now you are saying, 'We see,' so your sin remains.
